IT'S IN THE BAG!

It's hard to believe that we are over halfway through 2024 and the year is moving at a fast pace.

In March we launched soft plastic recycling in Whanganui then it was onto Invercargill in May and Gore in June bringing our geographic coverage to 87% of New Zealanders.

We have also overcome a significant hurdle to trialling kerbside collections of soft plastics with agreement to implement a trial in Nelson starting later this year. This will allow participating households to fill a Soft Plastic Recycling Scheme orange bag with their bags and wrappers, and put their filled orange bag in their recycling crate every other week for collection by our recycling partner EnviroNZ. This initial trial will have a separate collection system whilst we work through arrangements with the Ministry for the Environment to allow for our orange bags to be put in the commingled bin and transported on the commingled recycling truck.

The orange bags are made from 100% recycled plastic and for the trial will be supplied by Faza Plastics in Melbourne, allowing us to share the bag production costs with Australia where trials with a further 12 councils started this month.

We are excited about running this pilot and talking with other councils that have expressed interest as it will allow us to test households willingness to separate out their soft plastics and see what uplift we get from making recycling easier for people.

This will align New Zealand with other countries where soft plastics are accepted at kerbside including the most recent announcement by the Victorian Government in Australia which has committed to including soft plastics in the mixed recycling service of their Household Waste & Recycling Service Standard.

We need your soft plastics!

We hit a new high for collections in May with **95 tonnes** of soft plastic collected from **300 stores** or other public soft plastic recycling locations and over **100 member companies** that provide soft plastic recycling for their staff or customers.

We are now targeting 100 tonnes per month to service the increasing demand from Future Post and saveBOARD for our soft plastics.

2025 TARGETS

In 2018, when the Government and brands declared their commitment to using 100% reusable, recyclable or compostable packaging by 2025, seven years seemed achievable. However, the impact of Covid, followed by a cost-of-living crisis and an ever-changing landscape in what can be recycled, has moved the goal posts.

The USA Plastic Pact has recently announced that it has delayed key plastic packaging targets from 2025 to 2030. It is likely that other Plastic Pacts will follow suit.

From a Soft Plastic Recycling Scheme perspective, we also communicated 2025 to our members as when we would make changes to our material thresholds which were initially set in 2020. APCO has already revised its thresholds for packaging sold in Australia, however we have retained our thresholds for soft plastics placed on the market in New Zealand.

We are reviewing the thresholds with APCO however the Steering Committee recommends that soft plastic packaging meeting the current thresholds will be accepted as recyclable under our Scheme until 1 January 2027 which will allow producers time to move towards new thresholds which we will announce later this year.

The PPPS project has reached an exciting point with stakeholder briefings on the scheme design proposal facilitated by Grant Thornton being held. Should government introduce a mandatory product stewardship scheme, based on this work, regulations could be applied, such as setting a fee to support the end-of-life management of the in-scope products. SOFT PLASTIC RECYCLING LAUNCH IN INVERCARGILL

Thanks to the team at The Warehouse on Leven Street in Invercargill for hosting a fabulous event attended by our members, council staff and the local community.

Soft plastic recycling bins are also located at Woolworths Tay

Street and Waikiwi as well as The Warehouse and Woolworths stores in Gore. Recycle South collect and bale the soft plastic, preparing it for safe transport to Future Post's facility in Blenheim for recycling into fence posts and raised garden beds.

RECYCLE SOUTH

The launch in Invercargill was an opportunity to visit Recycle South's recycling plant. Recycle South is a not-for-profit social enterprise which provides people with disabilities meaningful employment.

In addition to the recycling plant, Recycle South has also opened a re-processing plant for farm plastics (LDPE and HDPE) accepting agricultural plastics, bale wrap, drums and containers which are washed, shredded and turned into plastic pellets.









Proposed regulatory changes impacting soft plastics in Victoria, Australia

The Victorian Government has committed to including soft plastics in the mixed recycling service of this service standard at a future date to be determined based on industry capacity to accept this material. Recycling Victoria will continue to review industry capacity to accept soft plastics in the mixed recycling service in all municipal councils and alpine resorts. The first review of this service standard is expected to consider this, with a view to introducing a consistent approach across all municipalities at that point. If a council or ARV has an off-take arrangement in place, then the council or ARV is able to accept soft plastics in the mixed recycling stream.

SOFT PLASTIC AUDIT - SUNSHINE YATES

Sunshine Yates Consulting conducted the annual soft plastics audit in April to provide valuable insights into what types of soft plastic bags are being recycled by consumers. We have been conducting similar audits since 2020.

Twenty-two bags of soft plastic weighing a total of 99 kilograms were collected from Woolworths Ponsonby and Sunnynook, PAK'nSAVE Glen Innes, New World Albany, and Abilities Group and taken to the Tamaki Zero Waste Hub for the audit. The four stores were selected as representative of the post-consumer soft plastic collected at supermarkets across New Zealand. Abilities Group bales soft plastic collected across Auckland and Hamilton from The Warehouse stores and other collection points.

The soft plastic was sorted into 31 primary categories compared to 16 categories in the early audit years. This year the most recycled categories are shown right.

Contamination levels were just 3.9% by weight.

The audit also included an analysis of how many bags have the ARL or SPRS recycling logo. 16.8% of bags audited now carry the SPRS logo with 8.8% using the ARL.

Wholly Shrink bin lid trial

Wholly Shrink (specialist distributor of household soft plastic compactors) is running a trial with New World Whangaparaoa and PAK'nSAVE Albany using a promotional lid on the store's soft plastic collection bin to test whether this will:

Reduce contamination: The lids will encourage customers to pause and consider what they are disposing of, minimising contaminants like coffee cups, general rubbish, and drink cans.

Promote Wholly Shrink: The lids will feature a promotion for Wholly Shrink's compactors, helping customers compress their soft plastics at home, thereby reducing the frequency of bin changes in stores.

TC Transcontinental "Customer Centric – We've got it made" staff conference
